Members have an option to vote either through e-voting or through physical ballot form. If a member has opted for e-voting, then he/she should not vote by physical ballot also and vice versa. However, in case members cast their vote both via physical ballot and e-voting then e-voting shall prevail and voting done through physical ballot shall be treated as invalid. The Company has signed an agreement with CDSL for facilitating e-voting.

Operations:

Once again, the Board of Directors herewith informs you that your Company's Shares were duly listed with Metropolitan Stock Exchange of India Limited (MSEI), Mumbai in 2020. Further, the Company has been striving to get the trading permission to enrich the shareholders wealth.

During the year the company continued the activities of Solvent extraction, Rice Mill operations. Power Plant and Steel plant closed for six months due lack of raw material.

Solvent Extraction Division:

This division earned an after Tax Profit of Rs. 152.13 lakhs as against profit of Rs. 136.44 lakhs during the previous year. It processed 29806.614 M.Ts of Rice Bran as against 32857.708 M.Ts of Rice Bran during the previous year.

Power Division:

This division earned an after tax Loss of Rs.(81.41) lakhs as against profit of Rs.166.80 lakhs during the previous year. It has generated 147.705 lakhs of units as against 282.53 lakhs of units during the previous year.

Steel Division:

This division earned an after tax Loss of Rs.(207.94).lakhs as against Loss of Rs.(105.63) lakhs during the previous year. It produced 1479.800 Mt of Iron Ingots as against 4560.800M.Ts of Iron Ingots during the previous year.

Rice Mill Division:

This division earned an after tax Profit of Rs.229.86 lakhs as against Loss of Rs.(15.19)lakhs during the previous year. It Paddy milling for Hire work 43942.640Mts and paddy milling for own 19037.926Mts as against paddy milling for Hire Work 52771.840MTS and paddy milling for Own 19054.204 MTS.

Dividend & Reserves:

To keep the capital base of the Company stronger and with a view to make the Company cash rich, your Directors are not recommending any dividend for the year 2022-23.

Share Capital:

During the year under review, the Company has not issued Equity Shares/ shares with differential voting rights/ granted stock options/ sweat equity.

Deposits:

Your Company has not accepted any deposits within the meaning of Section 73 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014 and as such, no amount of principal and interest was outstanding as on 31st March, 2023.

However, your Company availed Loans from the Directors and relatives of Directors and the amount of principal is Rs.1135.00 Lakhs and interest of Rs.160.71 Lakhs is outstanding as at 31st March, 2023.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Overview

The Management Discussion and Analysis sets out the developments in the business environment and the Company's performance since our last report. This analysis supplements the Directors' Report and the Audited Financial Statements forming part of this Annual Report.

Industry and Structure

Solvent Extraction Industry:

Indian vegetable Oil economy is the fourth largest in the world after USA, China and Brazil. Oilseed cultivation is undertaken across the country in 2 seasons, in an area aggregating approximately 26 million hectares. 80% of the India's domestic oil output comes from primary source that is 9 cultivated oilseeds and 2 major oil bearing oil seeds and the secondary source comprises solvent extracted oils, rice bran oil etc.

The Company's original business of Solvent Extraction is focused on quality extraction with emphasis on optimum productivity.

Power generation:

India, which accounts for around 85% of South Asian electricity generation, is facing serious power supply problems. Current generation is about 30% below demand, as a consequence, India is faced with the need to invest heavily in new electricity generating capacity. There has been a growing awareness about setting up small power plants at decentralized places based on renewable sources of energy to avoid the ill effects of pollution from the fossil fuel based power plants. All over the world renewable energy movement is taking place due to global warming and adverse effects of climatic change. The renewable source of energy consists of biomass, wind, small hydro and solar.

The Company has ventured into power generation as part of the integration process to utilize the internal resources in a best manner.

Steel Industry:

Manufacturing of "Iron Ingots" taking available surplus power being produced at the Power plant.

Rice Division

Paddy is the one of the main crops in the states of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana. Consumption of rice in both the states is more and hence the demand for the product is high. This unit is completely dependent on the availability of crop and government policies.

Company's Infrastructure

Your Company operates from its registered office situated at Vijayawada. The Company's unit, comprising of Solvent Extraction, Power Generation Plant, Steel Plant & Rice mill is located at Davuluru (V), Kankipadu Mandal, Krishna District, about 17 KM from the registered office of the Company.

Internal Control Systems

The Company has an effective internal control system in place and this is continually reviewed for effectiveness and is augmented by written policies and guidelines. The Company's overall system of internal control is adequate given the size and nature of its operations and effective implementation of internal control procedures.

The internal control system of the Company is subject matter of Audit Committee's periodical review and suggestions and recommendations, if any, made by the committee will be carried out.

Opportunities and Threats

With the invitation of more participation by the private sector, the power generation industry is set to result in major opportunities for the Company, which has ventured into the foray of power generation. By utilizing the excess captive power, the Company started steel division and existing solvent division also is making use of the available power.

Risks and Concerns

The Company's current and fixed assets are adequately insured against various risks. The Company constantly strives to adequately protect itself from various business risks and concerns and takes appropriate measures to address the same.

The Company's operations are divided into four segments viz., Solvent Division, Power Division Steel Division & Rice mill division. A brief overview of the performance of the Company – division wise is as follows

Your Company is manufacturing iron ingots in its Steel Division. Your company is paddy milling in its Rice Division. After inter-segment eliminations, your Company has achieved a turnover of Rs. 14302.32 lakhs.

Other income mainly consists of freights & hire charges, interest on fixed deposits with banks, Interest on income tax refund and Insurance claim from Machinery break down policy.

Expenses

The Company has achieved cost efficiency due to overall control on overheads. The units of solvent extraction, Rice Milling units performed well and power, steel ingots have performed poor.

Finance Charges

Interest on loans during the year was Rs.160.37 lakhs as against Rs.125.09 lakhs for the year 2021-2022.

Profit Before Depreciation, Interest And Taxes (PBDIT)

PBDIT was Rs. 422.15 lakhs as against Rs. 469.15 lakhs for the year ending 31st March 2022. The decrease in PBDIT was profit decrease in Power & Steel divisions due to Sales and production decrease

Profit After Tax (PAT)

Profit after tax was Rs.86.36 lakhs for the year 2022-2023 as against Rs.165.11 lakhs for the year 2021-2022.

Earnings Per Share (EPS)

EPS has been decreased from Rs. 1.56 to Rs. 0.82 for the year under review.

A company's internal financial control over financial reporting includes those policies and procedures that (1) pertain to the maintenance of records that, in reasonable detail, accurately and fairly reflect the transactions and dispositions of the assets of the company; (2) provide reasonable assurance that transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and that receipts and expenditures of the company are being made only in accordance with authorizations of management and directors of the company; and (3) provide reasonable assurance regarding prevention or timely detection of unauthorized acquisition, use, or disposition of the company's assets that could have a material effect on the financial statements.

Inherent Limitations of Internal Financial Controls Over Financial Reporting

Because of the inherent limitations of internal financial controls over financial reporting, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projections of any evaluation of the internal financial controls over financial reporting to future periods are subject to the risk that the internal financial controls over financial reporting may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.

Opinion

Note 1 : CORPORATE INFORMATION

Balaji Agro Oils Limited is a public limited company having been incorporated on 06/05/1994 and is engaged in Solvent Extraction, Power Generation, Manufacture of Steel Ingots and Rice Milling activities. Accordingly, the company has got four divisions.

Note 2 : SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of Preparation:

a) Statement of Compliance

The financial statements as at and for year ended March 31, 2023 have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind-AS) notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules 2016.

The financial statements adhere to the relevant presentational requirement of the Companies Act 2013. All assets and liabilities are classified as current or non-current, wherever applicable as per the guidance as set out in schedule III to the Act.

For all periods up to and including the year ended 31 March 2022, the Company prepared its financial statements in accordance with Accounting Standards notified under section 133 of the Companies Act 2013 (Indian GAAP). These financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2023 are Company's first Ind AS financial statements.

Refer to Note 47 for information on how the Company adopted to Ind AS.

b) Basis of Measurement

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and on an accrual basis unless otherwise stated. (except for certain financial assets & liabilities)

The Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees and all values are rounded off to the nearest thousands except otherwise stated.

c) Use of estimates and judgment

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of

financial statements and the reported amount of income and expenses. Examples of such estimates includes future obligations under employee retirement benefit plans and estimated useful life of property, plant and equipment, employee benefit expenses, provisions etc. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on a periodic basis. Future results could differ due to changes in these estimates and difference between the actual result and the estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known /materialized.

2.2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

a) Statement of Cash flow:

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby profit / (loss) before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information.

For the purposes of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, cash at banks and demand deposits with banks, net of outstanding bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand are considered part of the Company's cash management system.

b) Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupee (INR), which is functional as well as presentation currency of Company.

c) Property, Plant and Equipment:

1. Property, Plant and Equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation/amortization and impairment loss, if any.
2. Cost includes all direct costs attributable to the acquisition and installation of fixed assets, including taxes, duty, freight and incidental cost and expenses directly attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.
3. Premium paid on acquisition of leasehold land, is treated as cost.
4. Capital work-in-progress is carried at cost, comprising direct cost, related incidental expenses and interest on borrowing to the extent attributed to them.

5. All expenditure incurred during construction / implementation stage of the project as shown under the head Project and Pre-operative expenditure has been capitalized on pro-rata basis to the cost of various Fixed Assets on commissioning of Project.

6. Cost of replacement, major inspection, repair of significant parts and borrowing costs for long-term construction projects are capitalized if the recognition criteria are met.

7. Upon sale of assets, cost and accumulated depreciation are eliminated from the financial statements and the resultant gains or losses are recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

d) Provisions:

Provisions are recognized in respect of liabilities which can be measured only by using a substantial degree of estimates when:

1. The Company has a present obligation as a result of a past event.
2. A reliable outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and
3. The amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated. Provisions are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date.

Discounting of Provisions

Provisions which are expected to be settled beyond 12 months are measured at the present value by using pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as interest expenses.

e) Revenue:

Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received and receivable and net of returns, trade allowances and rebates and amounts collected on behalf of third parties. It excludes Goods and Services Tax.

Revenue from sales and services is recognized when the same is measurable at the time of sale or the rendering of the service and no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of the consideration that will be derived from the sale or rendering service.

Transactions involving sales are based on transfer to the buyer, of all significant risks and rewards of ownership in the goods and, in the case of rendition of service, of the eligible performance.

Recognition of revenue is postponed due to the effect of uncertainties of ultimate collection, and revenue is recognized in the period when such uncertainties cease to exist.

Other Revenue recognition:

Interest income is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the interest rate applicable using Effective Interest rate Method.

Dividend will be recognized when the entities right to receive payment is established, economic benefit will flow to the entity and amount can be measured reliably.

f) Depreciation & Amortization:

Property, Plant and Equipment

Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment is provided on Straight line basis over the useful life of the assets as specified in Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013.

Depreciation on assets purchased/ sold during the year is charged on pro-rate basis as per Companies Act 2013.

The residual value of all assets is kept at 5 % of the original cost of assets.

Estimated useful life of assets for current and comparative period of significant items of property plant and equipment are as follows:

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date.

g) Impairment of non-financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS-36 Impairment of Assets, the carrying amounts of Company's assets are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date to determine whether there is any Indication of impairment.

An asset is treated as impaired when the carrying cost of assets exceeds its recoverable value and impairment loss is charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss in the year in which an asset is identified as impaired.

At each reporting date Company assesses the estimate amount of impairment loss. The impairment loss recognized in prior accounting period(s) is reversed if there has been a change in the estimate of recoverable amount and such losses either no longer exists or has decreased. Reversal of impaired loss is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

h) Inventory:

Inventories of Finished Goods are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value. Raw Materials are valued at Cost.

Cost comprises of cost of purchase, cost of conversion and other cost incurred in bringing them to their respective present location and condition. Cost of raw materials, stores and spares is determined on FIFO basis. Cost of Finished Goods is determined on absorption costing.

i) Borrowing Costs:

Borrowing costs that are attributable to the acquisition or construction of qualifying assets are capitalized as part of the cost of such assets. A qualifying asset is one that necessarily takes a substantial period of time to get ready for its intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs, as incurred, are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

j) Employee benefits:

Short Term Employee Benefits: (including Bonus paid @8.33% as per Bonus Act)

The undiscounted amount of short-term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by the employees is recognized as an expense during the period when the employees rendered those services.

Post-employment benefits and other long-term benefits:

i) Gratuity:

Gratuity amount payable to employees after retirement is a defined benefit obligation (funded) for the Company. To meet its liability towards gratuity covering eligible employees, in compliance of Ind AS 19 – Employee Benefits, the Company has taken a policy with LIC. Company pays premium based on actuarial valuation applying

the Project Unit Credit Method for this purpose to LIC as per requirement/availability of the funds.

ii) Provident Fund & Employee State Insurance (PF & ESI):

The Company makes contributions to a statutory provident fund in accordance with the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952. Accordingly, the contribution paid or payable and expenses, if any are recognized as an expense in the period in which services are rendered.

k) Taxes:

Current Tax:

Tax expense for the year comprises of current Income tax and deferred tax. Current tax is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities using the applicable tax rates. Current tax related to OCI Items is recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI).

Deferred Tax:

In accordance with the Indian Accounting Standard (Ind-AS 12) "Income Taxes" issued by Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognized for temporary differences which is computed using the tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred income tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred income tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be utilized.

Deferred tax related to OCI Item is recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI).

l) Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. The weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period is adjusted

for events of bonus issue and share split. However, no bonus shares issued or shares splitted at present.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares. However, there are no dilutive potential equity shares at present.

m) Contingent Liabilities and contingent Assets

Contingent Liabilities are disclosed in either of the following cases:

- i) Present obligation arising from a past event, when it is not probable that outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; or
- ii) A reliable estimate of the present obligation cannot be made; or
- iii) A possible obligation, unless the probability of outflow of resource is remote.

Contingent assets are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

Contingent Liability and Contingent Assets are reviewed at each Reporting date.

Contingent Liability is net of estimated provisions considering possible outflow on settlement.

n) Fair Value Measurement:

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability or in the principal market for the asset or liability, or In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible to the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest. The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure

fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

o) Dividend to equity holders

No dividend is declared, paid or payable by the company during the year under review.

p) Financial instruments:

Initial Recognition:

Financial Assets and Liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Notes on Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March 2023

Note-47 : First-time adoption of Ind AS

The company has prepared the opening balance sheet as per Ind-AS as on April 1, 2021 (the transition date) by recognizing all assets and liabilities whose recognition is required by Ind-AS, not recognizing the items of assets and liabilities which are not permitted by Ind AS, by reclassifying items from previous Indian GAAP to Ind AS as required under Ind AS, and applying Ind AS in measurement of recognized assets and liabilities. However, this principle is subject to the certain exceptions and certain optional exemptions availed by the company as detailed below.

47.1 Exceptions & Exemptions applied

Ind-AS 101 allows first-time adopters certain mandatory exceptions and voluntary exemptions from the retrospective application of certain requirements under Ind-AS. Company has applied the following exemptions:

Exceptions availed:

47.1.1 Government Grants

A first-time adopter shall apply the requirements in Ind AS 106, Financial Instruments, and Ind AS 25, Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance, prospectively to government loans existing at the date of transition to Ind ASs and shall not recognize the corresponding benefit of the government loan of a below market rate of interest as a government grant.

The entity uses the previous GAAP carrying value of "Sales Tax Deferment Loan" as on the date of transition as the carrying amount of the loan under Ind AS in the Opening Ind AS Balance Sheet and the same is treated as the starting point for computation of the Effective interest rate on the loan. Here, the Sales Tax deferment loan is repaid without any interest and hence the Effective interest rate is Nil.

Exemptions availed:

47.1.2 Estimates

The estimates at 1 April 2021 and at 31 March 2022 are consistent with those made for the same dates in accordance with Indian GAAP (after adjustments to reflect any differences in accounting policies).

The estimates used by the company to present these amounts in accordance with Ind AS reflect conditions at 1 April 2021, the date of transition to Ind-AS and as of 31 March 2022.

47.1.3 Deemed Costs

Since there is no change in functional currency, the company has elected to continue with the previous Indian GAAP carrying value of all Property, Plant and Equipment and Capital Work in Progress as recognised in the previous Indian GAAP financials as deemed cost at the transition date to Ind AS.

On 31-Mar-2022, the fair value of the Investment (being NAV of the Units) is **Rs.17,19,875/-** whereas the previous GAAP carrying value being cost is **Rs.5,06,000/-**. Hence, the carrying value is increased by **Rs.12,13,875/-** and adjusted against Opening reserves **Rs. 9,73,190/-** as on 01-Apr-2021 and credited to Profit & Loss A/c **Rs. 2,37,685/-** for the year ended 31-Mar-2022.

Note 2: Deferred Tax Assets (Net)

MAT Unused Tax Credit:

Under Previous GAAP, MAT unused Tax Credit balance is classified and presented under "Other Current Assets". However, as per Division II of Schedule III notified by MCA applicable for companies complying with Ind AS, unused tax credits (including MAT credit) shall be treated as Deferred Tax Assets and shall be presented as a part of Deferred Tax.

On 01-Apr-2021, MAT Credit of Rs.1,01,80,900/- is reclassified from "Other Current Assets" to "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)", resulting in increase in "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)" and decrease in "Other Current Assets" by **Rs.1,01,80,900/-**.

On 31-Mar-2022, MAT Credit of Rs.88,31,402/- is reclassified from "Other Current Assets" to "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)", resulting in increase in "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)" and decrease in "Other Current Assets" by **Rs.88,31,402/-**.

Deferred Tax Liabilities:

Under Previous GAAP, Deferred Tax Liabilities / Assets are created for any timing differences between accounting profit and Taxable profit as per AS 22. As on 01-Apr-2021, there exists net Deferred Tax Liability (on account of timing difference due to difference in depreciation allowable under Income Tax Act) presented under "Non Current Liabilities - Deferred Tax Liabilities (Net)".

As per New GAAP, under Ind AS 12, Deferred Tax Liabilities / (Assets) are created on account of taxable / (deductible) temporary differences using Balance Sheet approach. Thus, additional Deferred Tax Liabilities arise on account of Amortisation of Loan Processing fee & on account of Fair value measurement of Investment in SBI Blue Chip Fund.

On reclassification of MAT Credit from "Other Current Assets" to "Deferred Tax Assets" and creation of additional Deferred Tax Liabilities as above resulted in "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)" under New GAAP. Thus, existing Deferred Tax Liability is reclassified to "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)".

On 01-Apr-2021, existing Deferred Tax Liability (Net) of **Rs.42,77,804/-** is reclassified to Deferred Tax Assets (Net). Additional Deferred Tax Liabilities on account of Amortisation of Loan Processing fee & on account of Fair value measurement of Investment in SBI Blue Chip Fund amounts to **Rs.1,34,967/-** and **Rs.1,88,297/-** (aggregating to **Rs.2,43,231/-**) respectively. This results in decrease in "Deferred Tax Liabilities (Net)" by **Rs.42,77,804/-**, decrease in Opening Reserves as on 01-Apr-2021 by **Rs.2,43,293/-** (Rs.1,34,967/- + Rs.1,08,297/-) and decrease in "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)" by **Rs.45,21,897/-**.

On 31-Mar-2022, existing Deferred Tax Liability (Net) of **Rs.66,12,116/-** is reclassified to Deferred Tax Assets (Net). Additional Deferred Tax Liabilities on account of Amortisation of Loan Processing fee & on account of Fair value measurement of Investment in SBI Blue Chip Fund amounts to **Rs.1,84,489/-** and **Rs.1,34,746/-** (aggregating to **Rs.2,30,231/-**) respectively. This results in decrease in "Deferred Tax Liabilities (Net)" by **Rs.66,12,116/-**, credit to Profit & Loss A/c for the year ended 31-Mar-2022 **Rs.4,961/-** as Deferred tax income (On account of decrease in additional Deferred Tax Liabilities) and decrease in "Deferred Tax Assets (Net)" by **Rs.61,81,941/-**.

Note 3: Current Tax Assets

As per Schedule III notified by MCA, Current Tax Assets shall be shown as separate line item on the face of financial statements. Consequently "Current Tax Assets" as on 01-Apr-2021 has increased by **Rs.49,61,316/-** and "Other Current Assets" decreased by corresponding amount. Similarly, "Current Tax Assets" as on 31-Mar-2022 has increased by **Rs.61,84,823/-** and "Other Current Assets" decreased by corresponding amount.

Note 4: Borrowings - Non Current & Current

Under Previous GAAP, Borrowings are recognised at transaction value (amount borrowed) and are subsequently measured at Loan amount less principal repayments during the year. Loan Processing fee is charged to Profit & Loss A/c in the year it is incurred (in FY 2020-21).

As per New GAAP, under Ind AS 109, Loan shall be recognised at Fair value less transaction costs and shall be classified as Financial Liability measured at Amortised Cost. Hence, Loan processing fee shall be amortised over the term of the loan and the loan shall be carried at Amortised cost using Effective Interest method.

On 01-Apr-2021, an amount of **Rs.1,55,567/-** is reclassified from "Other Current Liabilities" to "Borrowings" and differential interest (on account of year and interest cut off adjustment) of **Rs.37,961/-** is added to the carrying amount. Further, unamortised Loan processing fee as on 01-Apr-2021 amounts to **Rs.4,85,250/-**. This results in decrease in "Other Current Liabilities" by **Rs.3,55,937/-**, decrease in the Borrowings by **Rs.91,892/-** and increase in Opening reserves as on 01-Apr-2021 by **Rs.4,47,289/-** (**Rs.4,85,250/-** increase on account of capitalising unamortised Loan Processing fee & **Rs.37,961/-** decrease on account of interest charged).

On 31-Mar-2022, an amount of **Rs.3,34,946/-** is reclassified from "Other Current Liabilities" to "Borrowings" and differential interest (on account of year and interest cut off adjustment) of **Rs.14,850/-** is added to the carrying amount. Further, unamortised Loan processing fee as on 31-Mar-2022 amounts to **Rs.1,75,576/-**. This results in decrease in "Other Current Liabilities" by **Rs.3,24,946/-**, decrease in the Borrowings by **Rs.26,880/-** and increase in Finance costs (decrease in Profit) for the year ended 31-Mar-2022 by **Rs.99,563/-** (**Rs.1,09,674/-** decrease on account of amortisation of Loan Processing fee & **Rs.23,111/-** decrease on account of interest differential credit).

Note 5: Current Tax Liabilities

As per Schedule III notified by MCA, Current Tax Liabilities shall be shown as separate line item on the face of financial statements. Consequently "Current Tax Liabilities" as on 01-Apr-2021 has increased by **Rs.23,43,879/-** and "Current Liabilities - Provisions" decreased by corresponding amount. Similarly, "Current Tax Liabilities" as on 31-Mar-2022 has increased by **Rs.38,81,876/-** and "Current Liabilities - Provisions" decreased by corresponding amount.
